Joan Miro

Joan Miró was a Spanish Catalan artist born in 1893. He was famous for combining abstract art with surrealism. He worked in a variety of media. Not only did he produce paintings and drawings, his body of work includes collages, murals, tapestries, and sculptures.

Joan Miro's famous sculptures:



Vocabulary	Definition
Surrealism	Sculptures which are based on fantasy/unreal images rather than realistic ones.

Proportion	The scale to which body parts or other elements of a sculpture are shown (how big or small).
Visual Symbolism	When an image in a sculpture represents

	something else.
Natural Sculpting	Sculpting that focuses on realism and natural forms.

Coils

Pieces of clay that have been curled together to make a circle shape.

<u>Phidias</u>

Phidias or Pheidias was a Greek sculptor, painter, and architect from Athens, Greece. He died in 430BC. His Statue of Zeus at Olympia was one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World.

Phidias' famous lost statue, Athena Parthenos, was approximated to have been around 11.5m tall. The photo on the left is a recreation of what it may have looked like and the picture on the right is an artist's representation showing just how big the statue would have been.
