






#### **Drawing Shadows**

When drawing shadows, you will recognise that the shadow is opposite where the light hits the apple.

If your object is **solid** and **opaque**, then the apple will block the light from going through it.











### Grading light to dark in pencil

When using pencil, there are many different types of 'graded pencils' to use. A normal school pencil is HB, but there are so many to use when drawing, sketching and shading.

Here is a guide of pencil grades. H is a lighter grade and stands for 'hard', and B is a darker grade and stands for 'black'.
