





Pencil Shading




Vocabulary observation the action or process of closely observing or monitoring something or someone. landscape all the visible features of an area of land. a method of creating the illusion of depth by using lines perspective that get closer together. focal point the area in the composition to which the viewer's eye is naturally drawn. In a drawing, the horizon line is the point where the horizon earth meets the sky. It is always at eye-level. atmosphere a feeling or mood created by a particular place or a work of art. the size of one object in relation to the other objects. scale the size of the parts of an object in relationship to proportion other parts of the same object. providing a range of light to dark by shading with tone pencil.

Using a viewfinder

The Viewfinder is a rectangular grid through which you may judge the positions of objects in the scene to be painted, and transfer them to the drawing paper. It is also used to scale up drawings from photographs.





SCALE=RELATIVE SIZE OF ONE OBJECT TO ANOTHER

PROPORTION=RELATIVE SIZE OF PARTS OF A WHOLE





Featured Artist



Vincent Willem van Gogh was a Dutch painter, born in 1853. The 'van' in his name is spelt with a little 'v'. He painted lots of landscapes, but also painted portraits and still life. He only painted for about 10 years, but created more than 2000 artworks! He mostly used oil paints, but also worked with watercolours, and other materials.

Van Gogh believed that drawing was the 'root of everything'. He felt it was important to practise drawing in black and white before working in colour. Van Gogh used drawing to practise interesting subjects or to capture an on-the-spot impression.
